Welcome to intermediate French!

A.K.A. becoming 'knowable'...

This month we celebrated a language-learning 'first' and had dinner with a family from our church...entirely in French! We chatted about life things, played with their kids, and enjoyed the fact that we could understand most of what they were saying (and that they seemed to generally understand us too!)

Our grammar may have started breaking down about halfway through, we left utterly exhausted, and our friends very much held the evening together with their patience and grace...but it was a lovely first!

During our time at St Andrew's Hall (CMS' training centre), we were encouraged to think about language learning in terms of becoming more 'knowable' as people. We're not sure how 'easy' we are to know in French yet, but

we praise God for encouraging us as we slowly grow in our capacity for relationships!

...and dangerous?

This month we also had a different kind of 'first' when our teacher explained to our class that, "religion cannot be addressed in any form" in our upcoming presentations.

Interestingly, this seems to be a fairly standard rule at our language school, but one which isn't flagged until the higher levels when students start learning how to express opinions and abstract ideas. **Apparently with more French at our disposal, we're also becoming more 'dangerous'!**

It was insightful for us to have this 'cultural explainer' moment as our teacher

reasoned out the 'logic' of 'neutral spaces' to a room full of foreigners. For example, that talking about religion would cause emotions to run high in the classroom, that it may look like trying to force our beliefs on others, and cause us to be overcome by strong feelings ourselves.

To be honest, we found this quite confronting. After all, as Australians no one has ever told us that we're not allowed to talk about our faith! We found ourselves working through feelings of disappointment, anger, and sadness, and needing to pray against a spirit of timidity on the one hand, and defensiveness and bitterness on the other. Discovering the way something like this 'pressured us' was a relatively new experience for us. However we realise that this is the norm for Christians in Belgium, in their schools, universities, and workplaces.

In the scheme of things, this was a pretty tame experience. But it was a strong reminder to us of how valuable (and counter-cultural!) the ministry of GBU is as it works to equip students to be 'public Christians' who resist cultural pressure to hide their faith and instead let it shine for the praise of their Father in Heaven (Matthew 5:14-16).

You can pray for the GBU as it continues to labour to that end! And that God would help us to conduct ourselves with godliness, prayerfulness and creativity as we keep figuring out how to be 'politely impolite' in our new culture.
