Mark 12:1-12 — "Our Motivation as Citizens: The Overflow of the Kingdom"

Main Point Summary

We live as **Kingdom people**—not seeking the Kingdom without the King, nor falling into fear or complacency, but as followers of Jesus:

- Driven by God's glory
- Grounded in the local church
- Bringing His truth, love, and justice to our community, nation, and the world

1. Don't Seek the Kingdom Without the King

Mark 12:1-9 - The tenants want the benefits of the vineyard, but not the authority of the owner.

- Like the Pharisees—and many today—we are tempted to desire Christian values (justice, dignity, peace) without Christ's Lordship.
- But the Kingdom is not just values—it is the reign of Jesus.
- He is the **cornerstone**. All of life and society must be built on Him.

Ask Yourself:

Am I trying to live a "Christian life" on my own terms, without daily surrender to Jesus?

2. Don't Fall Into Fear or Complacency

Mark 12:10-12 - The religious leaders fear the people, and act out of fear.

- Some Christians disengage from public life out of fear—of politics, of culture, of compromise.
- But Kingdom people are not silent or scared. We are bold, faithful, and active—not for political power, but for Kingdom witness.

• "We don't build God's Kingdom by changing society. We change society by living the Kingdom."

3. Let the Kingdom Overflow

m Where the people of God go, the Kingdom goes.

- From preschool boards to Parliament House, from sports clubs to Sunday services—Jesus is King, and **His Kingdom flows through us**.
- Not all our work is Kingdom work—but the **Kingdom affects all our work**.

Remember:

We don't need cultural success for Christianity to thrive. The Kingdom grows wherever Christ is Lord.
