All meetings were well attended, particularly the last meeting at Trinity City, where over 60 people gathered to hear about work in the Indigenous space.



# **Cultural Awareness Training**

As many know, Kathie & I have a Cultural Awareness Program that we have been rolling out nationwide. Churches and colleges have been the recipients of these programs. We are thankful for the opportunity to help people think through ministry in the Indigenous space.

This year we've led training at the Queensland Theological College, Brisbane School of Theology, and Bible College of South Australia.

Local churches have asked us to help them think through ministry to Indigenous people, especially churches with a large population of Indigenous people.

Other groups, like Christian Women Communicating International (CWCI) in South Australia and their counterparts in Queensland, seek to maximise their ministry's impact on our First Nations people.

#### AEF National Women's Conference

Kathie attended the AEF National Women's Conference in Victor Harbour in April this year. As a leadership team member, Kathie was very busy organising the conference. Around 40 ladies were in attendance, and there were many day visitors as well. Stella Sloane from Wellington, NSW, gave the keynote address for this event, speaking on the theme of Treasures in Earthen Vessels.

The most recent event we attended was the Katherine Christian Convention, where I helped with the sound for the weekend. It was wonderful to see many of the communities present for this gathering. Numbers were up on last year. I estimate that around 600 people were present for the weekend. This meant that services at night finished around 11 pm.

One of the convention's highlights was having four pastors from various communities help with the keynote address, again emphasising Indigenous empowerment. Those who spoke, spoke on the theme of living water. It was so encouraging to see our Indigenous people taking up the challenge and being there to encourage it.
