## Next stop, intermediate French...



At the moment we feel like we're 'half-way' to having usable French. We walk away from most conversations with a general sense of what was said, but often without the details. We can follow the gist of a sermon, but are lost when the preacher goes off his notes. Sometimes when we talk, people nod and listen like there's no problem. Other times they look puzzled and say 'what??'. As you can see from the graphic above, this is what it looks like to be about to start intermediate French. Our aim in the next 8 months is to finish 'upper-intermediate' (by March/April next year). This will not be fluency, but is the recommended baseline for starting ministry. God has brought us so far, but we still have a way to go!

# 4 Things Motivating Us As We Begin Intermediate French...

### 1) In Belgium, French is more than the 'local language'...



When we first arrived in Belgium, we knew that half the country spoke French. What we're starting to realise is that speaking French is one thing, but being 'francophone' is another. In a country deeply divided by it's two official languages, French marks out a distinctive community and cultural identity (and one which is empathically different to it's Flemish counterpart).

For us this means that over time, our goal will be not simply to become 'French users', but to **build a Belgian 'language identity' that is francophone**. This will be a long road! But we're starting to sense more of **the weight that French carries here** and the way that it will situate us to live less 'on the surface' and more authentically for Jesus in Belgium.

## 2) Opening the Bible is a 'high bar'...

A while ago we asked our French teacher about some unfamiliar grammar that we'd come across in the Bible. He waved us off and said 'Oh that's archaic! You don't need to worry about that'. It was a reminder that despite being familiar to us in English, the Bible is an ancient and literary text, and is not yet very accessible to us in our



second language. We rejoice that the fruitfulness of our future ministry will never come from our perfect mastery of biblical French. However, we appreciate more and more how high the 'bar' is as we work towards opening the Word through which God does His work.

### 3) In transient Brussels, slow is good...



As the capital of the EU, Brussels is a highly transient city. Our neighbourhood is constantly full of 'to rent' signs, and it took about a year to work out who was in the 'core community' at our church. The ministry scene is also somewhat transient, with expat ministries coming and going quite frequently. In this context, taking our time to learn French properly is a sign we're here for the long term.

And while we don't think that we'll stop being the 'new kids on the block' any time soon, we're beginning to see more clearly the value of this period of learning, as we wait to understand more, be welcomed in, and eventually join what God is already doing.

## 4) Language is for God's glory...

When we first began learning French, we had enough grammar to describe God's character. A few months later we could talk about what He's done in the past and what He will do in the future. More recently



we've learned how to express things like regret, possibility, warning, and hope. This term we're learning the tense most often used in prayer. As our language grows, it's been a lovely reminder that language exists to tell of God's goodness and glory, something which fills and stretches all the grammar and vocabulary we can give to describe it.

Thank God for this encouragement and pray that He would fill our French with Himself as it grows!
