Over the last couple of months, David has had the privilege of being invited to speak in several contexts. He was the chapel speaker for the Tyndale Open Day at the end of April. In May, he took part in the European Leadership Forum in Poland, where he gave three seminars: one on the spiritual dangers of academia (for the Academic Network, which he co-led), on the lessons

Meet Abraham



Abraham is a student from Kenya who just graduated this month. He grew up in a poor family, and his schooling as a child was paid for through Compassion International--he was actually sponsored by a Dutch family, something which is very meaningful for him now. Abraham came to Tyndale to grow his Bible knowledge and sharpen his ministry skills, to make him more effective for service in Kenya. He graduated with a Master's of Evangelical

Theology, a degree which involves writing a thesis. David had the privilege of being his supervisor for his project. His topic addressed an area of need in the church in Kenya: he observed that while there is a healthy, biblical awareness of the reality of spiritual warfare, it is often divorced entirely from sanctification. In other words, Christians will seek to be freed from demonic oppression through their prayers and those of others, or through exorcisms, with little thought to the role of on-going, unconfessed sin in their own lives. Abraham's project first sought to confirm that this is a widespread issue in Kenyan churches (it is), and then to demonstrate that a biblical understanding of spiritual warfare will acknowledge sin as the primary way in which Satan seeks to bind Christians (without denying other ways he may also operate). As part of his project, Abraham designed a four-week curriculum on spiritual warfare, which he piloted through an online Bible study with some selected leaders. This was very well received, and Abraham plans to continue to develop this resource for use by Kenyan churches when he returns home. We thank God for this gifted and godly young man, and pray that God will use him greatly to build His church in Kenya.

Finally, in June he was invited to give an address on Christian leadership to a gathering of pastors and leaders of African Pentecostal churches in the Netherlands.
